### NIJ Overview

- Research, Development and Evaluation arm of the Department of Justice
- NIJ has two main research offices:
  - Office of Research Evaluation and Technology
  - Office of Investigative and Forensic Sciences
- NIJ Director serves as the Chief Evaluation Officer for DOJ
- NIJ hosts Crime Solutions repository of evaluation evidence



### **Crime Solutions**

- Repository of Evaluation Evidence on Programs and Practices
- Evaluations of over 500 programs listed
  - 136 programs in Corrections and Reentry
  - Programs are rated as:
    - Effective
    - Promising
    - No Effects





### Corrections Related Research at NIJ

- Supports research on Institutional and Community Corrections, and Offender Reentry
- Reoccurring calls for Corrections and Reentry Evaluation Research
- Other Relevant Research also Comes From:
  - Graduate Research Fellowship
  - Safety, Health and Wellness
  - Artificial Intelligence

## NIJ Investment in Corrections and Reentry Research

- Initiated 22 Corrections Research Projects in the last Two Years
  - ~ \$20 million investment
- Projects include topics on:
  - Development of AI algorithms to assist Community Supervision
  - Medication-Assisted Treatment for Opioid Addiction
  - Risk-Needs-Responsivity Program Evaluations
  - Alternative Young Adult Housing Programs
  - Evaluation of Body-Worn Cameras in Jails
  - Correction Officer Occupational Prestige



# **Notable Ongoing Projects**

- Correctional Officer Suicide in Massachusetts
- Restrictive Housing:
  - Inmate and Officer Well-Being
  - Offender Misconduct
  - Step-Down Programs
- Contraband and Mitigation Techniques
- Impact of Parental Incarceration on Children





### **Recent Findings**

- Kiosk Supervision effective for Low-risk Offenders
- Home Visits can Reduce Recidivism
- Implementing New Initiatives can be Difficult
- Training alone is Inadequate to Implement New Programs
- Jails can Systematically Address Inmate Self-Harm
- Managed Access Systems Reduce Value of Contraband Cell Phones




# Enhance Rigor of Evaluations of Reentry Initiatives

- Provided over \$11 million in Funding on Evaluations of Reentry Programs since 2018
- Ensured Evaluations had the Highest Standard of Rigor
  - Many Evaluations use Quasi-Experimental Designs
  - May Show Greater Impact when Compared to an RCT



# Charting a Path Forward: NIJ's Corrections Strategic Research Plan

- Describes Three Broad Priorities:
  - Optimize Workforce Development
  - Enhance Correction Practices
  - Individuals Involved with the Corrections System
- Priorities are supported by Nine Research Objectives

## First Step Act

- Federal Prison System Reform and Recidivism Reduction
- NIJ is mandated to:
  - Assess BOP's Current Risk Assessment System
  - Develop and Evaluate a New Risk Assessment System
  - Develop Recommendations on Reentry Programming
  - Continue Second Chance Act Research
- NIJ established an Independent Review Committee (IRC) to Facilitate these Tasks





# **Introducing PATTERN**

- Predicts the likelihood of General and Violent Recidivism over a 3-year period
- Includes Static and Dynamic Factors
- Gender-specific Prediction Models
